HOT TOPIC 1

Marie-Uguay Library A THIRD PLACE

Through rich and constantly evolving programming, Marie-Uguay Library has become a third place, meaning a social environment separate from that of one's home (first place) and work (second place). For the current staff, the library is no longer strictly a still and quiet place for reading and studying, but rather a place for the social life of the community, where people of all ages can meet and chat. The city council supports the many creative initiatives of the Marie-Uguay Library team, such as story time, teen Fridays, homework assistance, iPad courses for seniors and the amazing Nuit Blanche, the second edition of which was recently a huge success. In addition, we will soon be announcing the opening of the toy library, an educational toy and game lending service for the whole family.

Green thumb

This winter, the City of Notre-Dame-de-l'Île-Perrot is using a product derived from sugar beets to increase the effectiveness of the de-icer applied to our roads. With this 100% organic and biodegradable product, less road salt is needed to cover the same area as conventional de-icers. For comparison, conventional road salt is effective to -12°C, and 120 kg is required to cover 1 km of roadway, while road salt sprayed with beet juice is active to -28°C, and only 85 kg is needed to cover 1 km of roadway.

The benefits of spraying road salt with beet juice are numerous, including less chloride, fewer applications, lower costs (for example for de-icer and fuel), a smaller environmental impact (less chloride in soil and groundwater), less corrosion from road salt, better management of labour and equipment, and increased road user safety. As well, there is no need to worry about all the roads in Notre-Dame-de-l'Île-Perrot turning red this winter. The beet juice used is colour less and will not stain vehicles or clothing.



Electric charging station

In November, the city council approved the installation of an electric charging station in Des Éperviers Park for electronic devices. This innovative, 100% solar-powered technological solution, created specifically for NDIP, will enable park users to charge their electronic devices on site, while they continue their activities. The charging station is an additional service made available to residents of Notre-Dame-de-l'Île-Perrot to facilitate the free access to Wi-Fi in Des Éperviers Park.

The city council wishes to acknowledge the retirement of Alain Leduc. An employee of the City since 1985, Alain held various positions, including driver-operator and assistant foreman.
