TREE CUTTING AND **RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENT**

lopment is a central issue for municipalities. In NDIP, always seeks to find a reasonable balance between spaces and residential development. We are very Id of the beauty of our landscapes and want to protect them for future generations. However, it should be remembered that development land within wooded areas belongs to private owners. If they so wish, these owners have every right to subdivide the land and build houses, as long as they comply with zoning rules. Obviously, any residential development project must be examined by the Technical Services and Urban Planning teams and authorized by Council. Once the compliance and technical feasibility of the project are confirmed, an agreement is signed with the developer in which the City can set specific requirements.

When cutting down trees is unavoidable, a conservation and protection plan must be approved by a municipal officer before work begins. This plan must prioritize the conservation of trees that are most likely to survive and grow in their new environment. When trees cannot be preserved or not in sufficient quantities, the City requires the conservation or planting of various species of trees according to specific density ratios and criteria set out

Thanks to these requirements, new residential neighbourhoods will benefit from a healthy and diverse canopy for the foreseeable future.

Green Thumb

October 2020, nearly 1,000 trees and shrubs were planted by the Arbre-Évolution team and Public Works employees of the City of Notre-Dame-de-l'Île-Perrot to strengthen the fore ecosystem of a conservation area in the heart of a residential neighbourhood. A windbreak hedge was also restored along Don-Quichotte Boulevard to prevent snow drifts and ice formations on the roadway in winter.

Thanks to reforestation efforts, since 2010, the canopy index has remained relatively stable in the City (approximately 38%), despite the destruction of many ash trees by the emerald ash borer. Compared to other CMM cities, NDIP is in an enviable position regarding canopy and forest cover.

FIRE STATION 2021 is a pivotal year

The fire station construction project is on target. The professional services contract has been awarded by Council, preparation of the plans and specifications has begun, and we will be ready to launch the call for tenders for construction at the beginning of 2021. However, we have encountered several obstacles regarding the authorisations required for the land. Despite a 1988 decision by the Commission de protection du territoire agricole du Québec (CPTAQ), giving the City the right to build residential or commercial buildings on this land, which is in an agricultural zone, CPTAQ is now refusing to authorize the construction of a fire station that will improve the protection of our citizens. We are therefore continuing our efforts to have our rights to this land, acquired in 2009. recognized. This case is a good example of the lack of autonomy of municipalities to protect their territory. The City of NDIP consists of almost 70% agricultural land. Council does not approve applications for agricultural rezoning to build residential buildings, and we strictly oversee the cutting of trees by developers. Nevertheless, we face a lack of understanding on the part of certain government bodies in our efforts to ensure the safety of residents. The fire station will obviously protect our territory from fire-related losses, but it will also house the first responders service. First responders are now an essential service; they are the first to arrive at the scene of a disaster when an ambulance is called. They are also the first on site to provide certain care and to reassure residents. Building this infrastructure on our territory is not a mere whim; it responds to a real safety need. The stakes are too high: Council will not give up and will continue its efforts to ensure the project's completion as planned in September 2021.
